The department has reintroduced Gandhian Economic Thought at Post-graduation level when in contemporary times a need has been felt about the alternative developmental paradigm. Prior to the re-introduction, a brain storming workshop had been organised where a number of Gandhian scholars and social workers participated.

Kendra-nivas, Block-placement is a programme started by the department where the fourth semester post-graduate student would try to understand an economic activity by government/non-government/co-operative agencies working for the marginalised section of the rural society.
